

## **BA (Hons) Politics, Human Rights and International Relations – SH 356**

### **1. Context and Objectives (including relevant competencies)**

This course creates opportunities for students willing to explore key aspects of political science while developing an in-depth knowledge of human rights and international relations. Graduates will gather the required skills to work in the private and public sector; in NGOs dealing with human rights and in national, regional and international human rights institutions, including Commissions and Observatories.

### **2. Learning Outcomes**

Graduates in Politics, Human Rights and International Relations will:

- Discuss the conceptual and theoretical foundations of politics, human rights and international relations.
- Demonstrate a critical appreciation of the relationship between politics, human rights and international relations
- Appraise the multilevel governance structures involved in the study of politics, human rights and international relations.
- Employ the conceptual and theoretical foundations of the three main strands of the programme to independently examine and evaluate current events and issues at both domestic and international levels.
- Develop the basic academic skills to conduct research in the fields of human rights, politics and international relations

### **3. Teaching and Learning Methods**

Main teaching methods are lectures, tutorials, seminars and working groups.

Learning methods will include: - case studies, the use of community resource persons, debates, group discussions, hypotheticals, mock trials, visual aid, participant presentations and exhibitions.

### **4. Entry Requirements**

#### **General**

In accordance with the University General Entry Requirements for admission to undergraduate degree programmes.

#### **Programme (Specific)**

- A credit in English Language at Cambridge School Certificate / 'O' Level or equivalent.
- 2 GCE 'A' Level passes in 2 subjects.

## 7. Assessment and Deadlines

Each module will be assessed over 100 marks with details as follows (unless otherwise specified):

Assessment will be based on:

### **Continuous Assessment: 40%**

Continuous Assessment will be based on a compulsory written class test and assignments/or oral presentations. The continuous assessment will count for 40% of the overall percentage mark of the module(s), except for a Programme where the structure makes for other specific provision(s).

An overall total of 40% for combined continuous assessment and written examination components would be required to pass the module, without minimum thresholds within the individual continuous assessment and written examination. The same criterion will apply for modules being assessed jointly. Note that all overall mark for the two modules will be considered and not the individual marks for each of the two modules.

### **Examinations: 60%**

A written examination of 2 to 3-hour duration counting for 60% of the overall percentage mark for the module.

Written examinations for all modules will be carried out at the end of the academic year except for semester modules (unless otherwise stated).

## Submission Deadline for Dissertation / Research Project

Three copies of the dissertation (two spiral-bound copies and one soft copy in a single PDF text file on electronic storage media) should be submitted to the Faculty/Centre Registry and in addition, a soft copy of the dissertation in a single PDF text file should be uploaded on the "Turnitin' Platform", in the final assignment submission link indicated by the Programme/Project Coordinator.

All of the above should be submitted not later than the last week day of March of the academic year by 4.00 p.m. at latest, unless specified otherwise in the Programme of Studies.
