MA French (Specialisation: Language Studies) P/T – SH511 [Under Review]

1. CONTEXT AND OBJECTIVES

The MA French (Specialisation: Language Studies) programme builds upon previous undergraduate studies. It is designed to combine training in a variety of fields where specialised language competencies and skills are required with the development of critical and methodological skills. It also provides an opportunity to enhance professional qualifications to acquire a competitive advantage on the job market in the public and private sectors (in education, media, public relations and related sectors). It also provides a sound foundation for doctoral studies (MPhil/PhD) to students who wish to pursue an academic career path and/or develop further their research skills.

2. LEARNING OUTCOMES

Having successfully completed this programme,

- In the cognitive domain, a student should be able to:
 - 1. Demonstrate a broad understanding of linguistics and applied linguistics;
 - 2. Expand knowledge of specific research areas;
 - 3. Reinforce both oral presentation and scientific writing skills;
 - 4. Use acquired relevant jargon;
 - 5. Apply language and communication skills in French;
 - 6. Use independent critical thinking and problem-solving skills;
 - 7. Use rigorous research skills, and critically examine and/or evaluate theoretical and methodological approaches.
- In the affective domain, a student should be able to:
 - 8. Participate actively and in an ethical manner in both group work and independent activities as well as in department seminars/workshops/conferences;
 - 9. Manage time effectively and be committed to achieve learning outcomes.

3. TEACHING AND LEARNING METHODS

The programme aims to provide several modes of delivery of courses to students. Independent study will consist in personal reading, essay writing and individual research work. Students will delve into active learning through various practical group activities, problem-solving activities, oral presentations and/or debates. E-learning and/or blended learning will be combined with research-based activities (bibliographical research, for example). Students will be required to attend seminars and conferences as well as guest lectures.

4. Entry Requirements

• GENERAL ENTRY REQUIREMENTS FOR ENTRY TO THE UNIVERSITY

Successful completion of an undergraduate degree with:

- o At least a Second Class or 50%, whichever is applicable or
- A GPA not less than 2.5 out of 4 or equivalent, from a recognised higher education institution.

OR alternative qualifications acceptable to the University of Mauritius.

• PROGRAMME REQUIREMENTS

At least a Second Class Degree in French from a recognized University or alternative qualifications acceptable to the University of Mauritius.

Admission will be granted after examination of the applicants' files. Applicants may also be convened for an interview.

5. PROGRAMME DURATION – P/T

The Programme will be offered on a part-time basis. The duration of the programme should normally not exceed 4 years (8 semesters).

6. ASSESSMENT AND DEADLINES

- Continuous Assessment: 40% - 50%

Each module will carry 100 marks and will be assessed as follows (unless otherwise specified):

- Assessment will be based on a written examination of 2-hour duration and continuous assessment will carry 40%-50% of total marks (unless otherwise stated).
- o An overall total of 40% for combined continuous assessment and written examination components is required to pass a module without minimum thresholds within the individual continuous assessment and written examination. All modules carry equal weighting.
- The same criterion as above will apply for modules being assessed jointly. Note that all overall
 marks for the two modules will be considered and not the individual marks for each of the two
 modules.
- o Modules having a strong methodological component and marked "M" at the end will be assessed entirely by continuous assessment.
- Written examinations for all modules, whether taught in semester 1 or in semester 2 or both, will be carried at the end of the academic year (unless otherwise stated).

-Examinations: 50% - 60%


